Associate Dean April Dawson

April Dawson is the inaugural Associate Dean of Technology and Innovation and a Professor of Law at NCCU School of Law and oversees the operation of the NCCU Technology Law & Policy Center. A thought leader at the intersection of law, technology, and legal education, Dawson is the author of *Artificial Intelligence and Academic Integrity* (Aspen, 2023) and co-author of the forthcoming *AI & Legal Reasoning* (Aspen, 2026). She serves on the ABA Center for Innovation Governing Council and the ABA Science & Technology Law Section's Law School & Interdisciplinary Education Outreach Committee. Dawson teaches several law and technology courses including the first-of-its kind AI Governance course.



Attorney Miriam Johnson

Attorney Johnson is a 2018 graduate of the North Carolina Central University (NCCU) School of Law. Her interests include Gaming and Gaming Law, Child Privacy, Multilingual E-Discovery, and Educational Technology. Before attending law school, Attorney Johnson worked in auditing and compliance for Georgia and North Carolina's Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). Since graduating, she has worked with Consilio Services, Inc. in e-discovery, focusing on Spanish and English language projects, quality control, and compliance. Attorney Johnson currently teaches Video Gaming and the Law at NCCU School of Law and is actively researching child privacy laws and digital safety frameworks. She also holds the CIPP/US certification.



Attorney Diane Littlejohn

Diane Littlejohn is the inaugural Executive Director of the NCCU School of Law's Technology Law and Policy Center. A recognized voice on AI and emerging technologies, Littlejohn spoke at the ABA Tech Show in March 2023, covering NFTs, Web3, and the Metaverse. That year, she also taught Metaverse privacy for the Federal Bar Association and continued in 2024, delivering CLEs on AI and emerging technologies for the Durham Bar Association and TRT CLE. Alongside her teaching, she continues to practice law, focusing on intellectual property, small business legal structures, and contract drafting, with personal interests in travel and podcasts.



Attorney Cedric Pickett

Cedric Pickett is a 2018 graduate of the NCCU School of Law. He joined the NCCU Technology Law & Policy Center in 2022 as its first Technology Law Fellow and was appointed the inaugural Director of the Data Privacy & Cybersecurity Program in 2024. Attorney Pickett now serves as a privacy manager outside the university while continuing to support the TLPC as an adjunct professor, lending his time and expertise to advance its mission. During his tenure, he has been instrumental in developing the TLPC's Data Privacy Specialization Program, which prepares students for professional certifications including CIPP/US, CIPP/E, CIPM, CIPT, and AIGP.

PRO BONO

Pro Bono & The Community

In furtherance of the mission of NCCU Law, the TLPC collaborates with the NCCU Pro Bono Clinic to ensure that students earning the LTC are able to complete 25 legal tech-related pro bono hours, which is one of the requirements for earning the LTC.

Through this program, students must provide voluntary, law tech-related services to people of limited means or to community-based nonprofit organizations for which the student does not receive academic credit or pay. The NCCU Pro Bono Clinic has significantly expanded its outreach capabilities by

leveraging technology-based solutions. For instance, the integration of Gavel intake forms has streamlined processes within the NCCU Elder Law Project (ELP) Wills Clinics, enhancing client service delivery. While exact numbers vary annually, the technological support has empowered the Clinic to serve an increasingly large number of clients.

NCCU Law Pro Bono Clinic Director, Lakethia Jefferies, has been instrumental in the success of this initiative. Director Jefferies' leadership in incorporating tech solutions has positioned NCCU Law at

the forefront of legal clinical education, enabling more extensive pro bono legal services to those unable to afford them. Director Jefferies also teaches an Access to Justice Lab, which is a class in which students discuss the institutional, procedural, technological, and practical dimensions of the access to justice problem and explore and utilize technological platforms as mechanisms in forming practical, yet innovative, resolutions to aid in combating the access to justice crisis.

CAREER EXPO

We're excited to host our second Career Expo at the NCCU Law & Technology Summit, presented in partnership with the Technology Law & Policy Center (TLPC) and the NCCU Law Career Services Department.

KEYNOTE **SPEAKER**

ROY L. **AUSTIN JR.**

Inaugural Director of the Howard Law Artificial Intelligence Initiative and former Vice President and Deputy General Counsel at Meta.

Austin is the Inaugural Director of the Howard Law Artificial Intelligence Initiative and former Vice President and Deputy General Counsel at Meta. Before joining Meta, Austin was a partner at Harris, Wiltshire & Grannis LLP and McDermott Will & Emery. At both firms, he focused on criminal defense, civil litigation, and civil rights matters, building a strong reputation as an advocate for justice and equity.

Earlier in his career, Austin served as an honors Trial Attorney in the U.S. Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division. There, he investigated and prosecuted cases involving hate crimes and police misconduct. He was later appointed deputy assistant attorney general in the Civil Rights Division, where he oversaw the criminal section and supervised the special litigation section's work related to law enforcement accountability.

Austin also held a senior role in the Obama administration as Deputy Assistant to the President for the Office of Urban Affairs, Justice and Opportunity on the White House Domestic Policy Council. In this capacity, he coauthored the influential report on Big Data and Civil Rights, supported the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing, contributed to the development of the Police Data Initiative, advanced reentry support programs, and participated in President Obama's My Brother's Keeper Task Force.


